Removing the arterial line

What is an arterial line?

An arterial line is a small catheter that is inserted by a respiratory therapist or anesthesiologist into an artery, usually in the wrist. It is a fairly simple procedure. It is usually inserted to allow continuous monitoring of your blood pressure and/or for frequent blood samples. This line will be removed by the nurse in the recovery room before you are transferred to the day surgery unit or the care unit.

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Once the arterial line is removed:

- Avoid rapid and/or jerky movements of the affected limb for at least 1 hour following removal of the arterial line.
- Avoid hyperextension and any activity that places stress or strain on the affected limb for at least 24 hours.
- Do not lift anything weighing more than 10 lbs (4.5 kg) for the next 24 hours following the removal of the line.
- You can elevate your affected limb with a pillow to prevent swelling.

What to do with the dressing:

- The dressing at the site can be removed the next day and left open to air
- A small amount of bruising at the site is normal
- A small amount of dried blood on the dressing and at the insertion site is normal.

If bleeding occurs:

 Sit down immediately and press firmly with your fingers using a gauze on the insertion site for 10 minutes. If bleeding stops, rest and keep the affected limb immobile for 1 hour.

Monitoring:

- After the line is removed, you must monitor the site every hour for 6 hours. Go to the emergency room if any of the following problems occur:
 - A growing lump or skin that remains red and warm around the site
 - Active bleeding that does not stop
 - Worsening numbness in the affected limb
 - Intense pain at the insertion site

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
